#### DHL visit

#### Wednesday 19th September

Your child may have come home last week talking about a lorry in the school car park... They were correct, there was a lorry and it had permission to be there! We had a visit from DHL drivers, who came to talk to the children about safety near vehicles - especially such large ones! If you want to know more, ask them how heavy the lorry was... or how tall or how long. I can be sure they will be sure to share with you some fascinating facts. As an adult standing next to the lorry even I was amazed at the sheer size. The point was for children to understand some basics about being around large vehicles and to understand just how hard it can be for a driver to navigate there way around safely. The drivers explained to the children about how difficult it can be for them to see all around due to blind spots. They gave great interactive demonstrations with the children, who joined in with enthusiasm, keen to know more and ask questions. All children from year 1 to 6 joined in with the experience, and I'm sure on the day learned valuable lessons as we strive to inform and educate in all aspects of safety.
